## A FEW NOTES on the execution of my psalm verses:

- 1) I encourage a consistent duration of syllable length throughout the stretch of the reciting tone, with the exception of those syllables <u>underlined</u> (those having the natural emphasis in speech) ---- in which case, the underlines syllable should receive approx. double the duration (as in Gregorian chant).
- 2) All other highlighted text (italics & boldface) are merely for ease of sight in vertically aligning text with note changes.
- 3) Verses may be lightly accompanied or sung a cappella
- 4) When a verse setting is in plainsong style (i.e., without accompaniment), it is suggested that it be executed a cappella (or with organ doubling the melody), not with improvised accompaniment.
- 5) When a verse or line of a verse ends with a polysyllabic word or multiple syllables of a word on one note or chord, those syllables should be sung equally, as in speech, not in an erratic or rhythmic way.
- 6) Verses may be sung by cantor alone, or by choir; if by a choir, they may be sung in unison or in parts.
- 7) A slash indicates a clear break/breath.
